MOVING A STUDENT-COMMUNITY CENTERED UCC FORWARD INTO THE FUTURE!



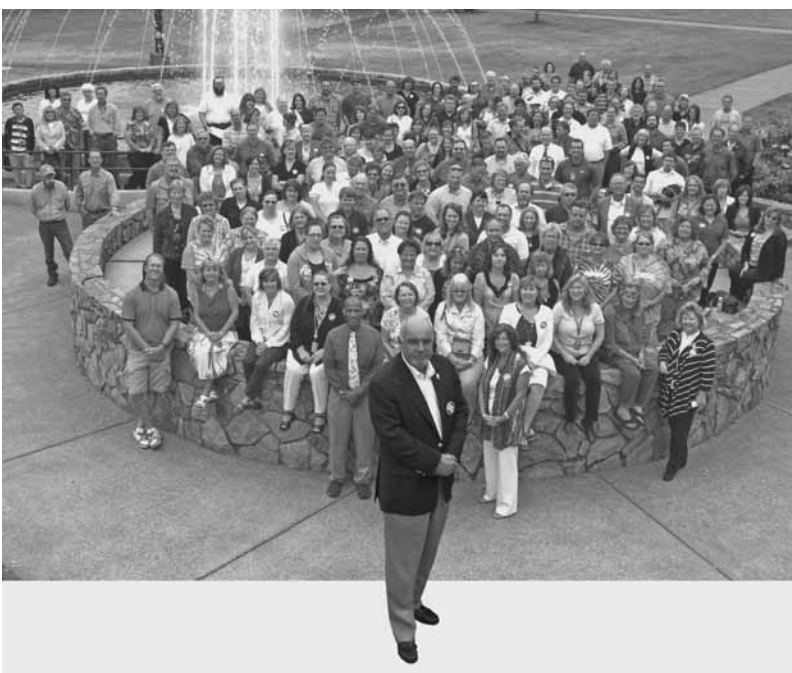

HOW TO READ THIS

Read the chart down the side to find the first day of the week your class meets. Next find the starting time of your class. Go across the column for the time of day of your final. Read to the top for the day of the week of your final.

EXAM NOTE

Day classes that begin at times other than those listed, or when the first weekly class session is on Wednesday, Thursday or Friday — the instructor will arrange for a final exam time that is open for all of the students in the class. Exams will be held in regular classrooms.

All examinations are to be given as scheduled. Only in emergency situations

will student requests be granted for times other than those listed on this schedule and then only by permission from the Division Director.

Night classes that meet only one night per week will have the final on that night.

Saturday classes will have their final exam at the regularly scheduled class time on the last Saturday prior to finals week.

COLLEGE OVERVIEW

GETTING STARTED

IF YOU ARE NEW TO UCC, WE RECOMMEND THE FOLLOWING STEPS TO GET YOU OFF TO A SUCCESSFUL START:



1. Complete an Application for Admission (page 95) and return to the Admissions office by mail, fax, online at www.umpqua.edu, or in person at Campus Center (with \$25 application fee).
2. Submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.gov by April 1 for priority consideration.

The FAFSA is the federal application for financial aid, but it is also used to apply for aid from other sources, such as your state or school.

Students seeking financial aid will need to contact the Financial Aid office on campus if assistance is needed
3. Students who have completed coursework at another college or university and are seeking a degree, must submit official transcripts from the previous schools.
4. Take the college placement tests (or have your SAT/ACT scores evaluated at the Advising and Career Service Center located in the Campus Center. Students who have official transcripts which demonstrate a grade of C or better in a college course in writing or math may not be required to take the placement test. Placement test scores are good for one year. Please call 541-440-4610 for available times.)
5. Meet with an advisor in the Advising & Career Service Center to map out your education. Your adviser can assist you whether you are undecided, want to go on to a four-year college and graduate school, if you want an AA degree or one-year Certificate or if your plans change after you start at UCC.
6. Review the college catalog and this Schedule of Classes to become familiar with important dates, policies, procedures, rights and responsibilities.
7. Attend New Student Orientation.

GETTING REGISTERED

REGISTRATION IS AVAILABLE FOR ADMITTED, ENROLLED AND RETURNING STUDENTS ONLINE OR IN PERSON.

Please refer to pages 27-33 in this Schedule of Classes, which provides additional information with regard to dates, tuition rates, policies and academic regulations. The following is a suggested checklist for students to complete their registration:

WHO MAY ENROLL?

UCC has an “open door” policy and will admit students who meet any one of the following entrance requirements:

- Graduates from an accredited secondary school.
- Individuals who have earned the GED Certificate of Equivalency or an Adult High School Diploma.
- Non-high school graduates who are 18 years old or over and whose high school class has graduated.
- Individuals who are 16 or 17 years old who are not required to attend high school and who furnish a written “Release from Compulsory School Attendance” may make application as a special student (ORS 339.030).
- Students who are attending high school as juniors or seniors who present written approval from their school officials. Course load must be approved by both schools.
- Some programs have special program requirements other than listed above.

If you are a citizen of another country you must meet certain federal immigration and college requirements before admittance to Umpqua Community College. International students can request special application materials from the UCC website.

Non-credit students are not required to submit a formal application.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

Students at Umpqua Community College are expected to conduct themselves in a manner compatible with an educational environment and in accordance with standards of the college that are designed to perpetuate its educational purpose. The Student Code of Conduct describes:

1. The responsibilities, rights and freedoms offered to students; and
2. The conduct that would interfere with the educational mission of the institution.

STEPS FOR NEW CREDIT STUDENTS

1. **Application**
 - A. Complete an application in the Campus Center Admissions Office or download a copy at www.umpqua.edu, and pay the \$25 application fee.

At the same time:

- B. Students interested in Financial Aid should contact the Financial Aid Office and begin the application process.
 - C. Submit official transcripts from other college(s) to UCC Admissions.
2. **Placement Test**

Take the free placement test, which is offered on a walk-in basis in the Advising and Career Service Center located in the Campus Center. Fees will be charged for re-testing.
 3. **Advising**
 - A. Following the placement test, an academic advisor will interpret the results, answer questions and help schedule classes. A professional advisor will answer additional questions you may have regarding

starting college, college resources and your career options. Professional counselors are also available to all students to assist with personal issues, which may be barriers to college success. The placement test, transcribed college courses, and recommendations from instructors may be used to place you in the appropriate classes.

- B. Next you may meet with a member of your new academic department to get acquainted and to learn more about your major.
4. **Registration**

Register on a walk-in basis and make arrangements to pay for classes (See the academic calendar printed each term in the class schedule, and on the web for dates and deadlines.)
 5. **Orientation**

Attend New Student Orientation Workshop. Check online for days and times.

RETURNING CREDIT STUDENTS

(degree seeking) Students not absent for more than one year.

1. The Advising Center will assist you to develop a schedule on a walk-in basis. A Term-by-Term Planner must be completed prior to registering for a second term or if you have changed your major.
2. If you plan to receive financial aid, check with the staff in the Financial Aid Office. If you are to receive veterans benefits, see the Veterans Coordinator. Remember, it takes 6-8 weeks to verify eligibility.
3. Continuing credit students who haven't been absent for more than a year may register by web or walk-in registration.
4. Continuing credit students who have been absent for more than one year must readmit before registering. (No charge for re-admission).

EARLY REGISTRATION AND PAYMENT

When a student registers early for a subsequent quarter or quarters, you are agreeing to pay the tuition and fees due. If you have no schedule changes, you may mail your check (with student name and identification number), or drop off the check at the Cashier's Office by the dates listed for each term.

PAYMENT OF TUITION AND FEES

Tuition and Fees for Fall Term may be paid in one of the following ways:

1. Payment in full or online payment plan **by September 20**.
 2. Approved Financial Aid.
- Registration **AFTER September 20** must be accompanied by payment in full or online payment plan.
- Failure to pay may result in being dropped from classes.
- Any unpaid debts will be put into the collections process thirty days after the end of the quarter. Appeals may be submitted to the Finance Office.

Other Financial Resources

Students who are receiving financial assistance from sources outside of the college must work with the source to meet the deadlines required by the UCC registration system.

OUTSTANDING FINES / DEBTS

If you owe library fines or other monies to the college, you will not be allowed to register until all such debts have been cleared through the college Cashier's Office.

CANCELLATION OF CLASSES

The college reserves the right to cancel any class because of extenuating circumstances, such as low enrollment.

REFUNDS

Credit Tuition Refunds

Students who withdraw from one or more UCC courses and who have complied with regulations governing withdrawals are entitled to certain refunds of tuition depending on the time of withdrawal. Refunds are limited to students who comply with withdrawal procedures. See Withdrawals in the college catalog on the website at www.umpqua.edu/acadlink.htm. Full tuition is refunded if withdrawal is made during the first week of fall, winter, spring and FALL quarters. For courses meeting less than 10 weeks the refund is prorated by the Registrar. No tuition refund will be made if withdrawal is made after these times. Refunds in all cases are calculated from the date refund is requested.

It is not calculated from the date a student ceases to attend classes. The only exception is in an unusual case where delay occurred for reasons beyond the student's control. Students will receive full tuition refunds for courses cancelled. With exception of students paying by credit card through **Sallie Mae**, all refunds

would be issued in the form of **check payable to the student regardless of the original form of payment or who paid for the course**. If the third party sponsored agreement is set up with Finance Office, refunds will be issued in the form of check to a third party.

Consequences for Not Paying

If you fail to pay your account, the college may take any or all of the following actions:

- Require immediate payment in full
- Block enrollment for any future terms
- Decline to provide official transcripts
- Turn accounts over to a collections status for non-payment after three months*
- Garnish Oregon State Tax Return

*Students will receive a final notice for accounts that are overdue before the college assigns them to a collection status and reports them to a credit bureau. The collection agency will add additional collection fees, court and attorney costs to account.

Past Due Accounts Assigned to a Collection Status After Three Months

Accounts will be turned over to a collections status for non-payment after three months. Students will receive a final billing statement for accounts that are overdue before the college assigns them to a collection status and reports them to a credit bureau. Failure to maintain a correct address with Registration will result in your account going to collections status if unpaid.

Past Accounts must be Paid at the Assigned Collection Agency

Students are not able to make payments to UCC for past-due accounts that have been assigned to a collection agency. Students wishing to pay off outstanding debts to UCC will be referred to the collection agency responsible for their account and will need to make payment in full to that agency. Students who have paid their accounts in full with the collection agency will not be able to register or have a transcript released until UCC receives the funds from the collection agency and the UCC account balance has been completely cleared. Payments from collection agency can take eight weeks to reach UCC. No exceptions will be made to allow a student to register or receive an unofficial

or official transcript until the account shows paid in full status.

FINANCIAL AID

There are four major types of aid: grants, scholarships, student loans, and work-study. Grants and scholarships do not require repayment. Loans require repayment with interest. Work-study requires that the student accept a job placement and perform work responsibilities to receive a monthly paycheck. Students receiving funds are required to be enrolled in classes and must meet the financial aid Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy. Copies of this policy are available online at <http://www.umpqua.edu/formPubs/finaid/sap.pdf>.

Students must apply for financial aid every year by filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA may be submitted as early as January for the following academic year beginning with the FALL term and ending with the spring term. In general, it is best to apply as early as possible. Applications are processed in the order they are completed.

If you apply for financial aid, standardized costs for tuition and books, room and board, transportation, and personal expenses will be used to determine a cost of attendance. This cost along with the information provided by your submission of the FAFSA and any other requested information will be used to calculate your eligibility for funds. Financial aid funds are awarded to students on the basis of fund availability and standardized federal formulas.

Applying for financial aid can be a time-consuming process. Your quick response to our requests can shorten the process. Forms or information returned late will slow or stop the process of determining your eligibility. As some funding is limited and is awarded on a first-completed-first-served basis, your delay may limit the types and amount of aid you receive. If you apply late, your financial aid may not be ready at the beginning of a term and you may need to pay for your tuition, fees, and books on your own (see "Payment plan" section for payment option) and have your financial aid reimburse you when you have been awarded.

Notification of financial aid awards are e-mailed to your college e-mail address. To ensure your right to privacy, information regarding awards to students is not available using the telephone or internet. Information regarding the status of your

application and award can be accessed through Riverhawk Web. If you need assistance in gaining that access please contact the help desk, 541-440-7808.

GENERAL INFORMATION

VETERANS SERVICES

The Veterans Education Services Office was established to provide service to veterans and their eligible dependents in applying for and receiving Veterans Administration educational benefits, VA work study, and other supportive services. You are encouraged to contact the Veterans Coordinator in the Campus Center Building for assistance.

PLACEMENT TEST

The placement test is required for all credit students. It is given on a walk-in basis in Testing Services, which is located in the Campus Center building. The placement test is an assessment tool which indicates the entry level of math, reading, and writing for each student. Placement test scores are valid for one year.

The initial cost of the placement fee is included in a new student admission fee. Retests are \$6 per section.

The placement test is not required of transfer students who have had their official transcripts from other colleges sent and evaluated by UCC and have successfully completed a math and writing course at other colleges.

DROPS / WITHDRAWALS

Students registered for classes are considered to be in attendance. Students discontinuing attendance without filing the official drop/withdrawal form in the Registration Office may receive a failing grade. Recipients of Title IV financial aid funds are subject to the federal regulations for withdrawals from classes for a term.

Students wishing to drop/delete (which does not appear on the academic transcript) from a course or courses must initiate the withdrawal procedure during the first 5 instructional days of each quarter, except for classes less than ten weeks in length. Complete and file the appropriate form in the Registration Office. After 5 days, the following withdrawal (appears on the academic transcript as a "W") procedures must be followed.

WITHDRAWAL FROM UCC

To withdraw from all courses, get the signatures of a counselor and Financial Aid. The withdrawal form may be obtained in the Registration Office and must be completed and filed in the Registration Office.

WITHDRAWAL BY INSTRUCTOR

Students who register for a class but do not attend the first class meeting, or contact the instructor before the first class meeting of the term may be withdrawn by the instructor.

STUDENT EDUCATIONAL RECORDS

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), also known as the Buckley Amendment, covers the release and inspection of each student's educational records. In compliance with FERPA, Umpqua Community College has formulated the Student Records Policy to outline the proper handling and release of student educational records. DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Umpqua Community College defines certain information as Directory Information, and this information may be released to a third party upon a written request. Students may sign a Directory Information Hold Form which will prevent the release of this information. Students who sign the request will not be listed in news releases concerning honor rolls, or in commencement related publications.

DISABILITY SERVICES

Disability Services advocates for and empowers students with disabilities through the provision of information, services, skill development, problem solving and self-advocacy to reach their full personal, academic and vocational potential.

BOOKSTORE

The UCC Bookstore is located in the Campus Center Building, on the main campus. The Bookstore offers course textbooks, general books, computer software and hardware, clothing, gifts, cards, snacks, and a wide variety of school supplies.

Bookstore hours are 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, for the fall, winter, and spring terms. Summer hours are 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

During the fall, winter and spring terms, the Bookstore will be open until 6 p.m. the first two days of classes. Please plan on bringing your class schedule to ensure the purchase of the correct textbooks for your classes.

You can now purchase textbooks online through the UCC Bookstore website with a Visa or Mastercard. Allow a 24 hour ship time and only street addresses will be accepted. NO PO BOXES.

The Bookstore also rents textbooks from an affiliate site through the Bookstore webpage www.umpqua.edu/bookstore. Textbooks purchased during the term may be returned until the end of the first week of school, providing the textbook is in the same condition as purchased and proof you dropped the class and a receipt for the item is provided. Textbooks or software in shrinkwrap, labeled "no-return if opened" may be returned for a refund at this time if un-opened. Opened items may be eligible to sell at the buy-back at the end of the term.

The UCC Bookstore will have a textbook buy-back during the last three days of finals week during fall, winter and spring terms. A limited buy-back will be held during the end of Summer term. Textbooks eligible for book buy-back usually include texts that will be used the next term on our campus. The textbook buyer also buys for other schools on a supply and demand basis. Price paid at buy-back varies with each book, but can be as much as one half the amount paid. The UCC Bookstore is a non-profit self-sustaining operation owned by Umpqua Community College.

STUDENT ID CARDS

All registered students are entitled to an ID card. The ID card serves as your official UCC photo identification and can be utilized as a UCC Library Card. A student ID card is required in order to get a parking permit. ID cards are available from the Student Life Office; call 541-440-7749 for ID processing hours. ID cards must be validated each quarter you are enrolled; validation stickers are available from the Information Desk, located in the Campus Center; from the Cashier, located in the Administration building, and the Student Life Office, located in Campus Center.

PARKING

Umpqua Community College provides more than 1,450 parking spaces located near all campus buildings. Of these, 171 are designated to all part-time and full-time employees. All employees are given a yearly parking permit. Designated parking spots for employees are marked by green lines, curbs and employee only signage. All part-time and full-time students also receive a yearly parking permit. Parking permits are available from the Information Desk in the Campus Center. A student ID card is required in order to get a parking permit. Permits must be placed inside the car on the lower left corner of the front windshield. Designated parking spots for students are marked by yellow lines, curbs and student only signage. All white marked lines and curbs are regarded as open parking. These spots are available to everyone. There are 14 parking spots clearly designated for the college Motor Pool and off limits to general parking. Red zones are usually fire related areas and are considered restricted lanes and zones with no parking allowed at any time. Visitor parking is clearly divided into 2 separate areas. One area is 30 minute visitor only and the other is Visitor Day parking only. All areas are designated by purple curbs, lines, and signage. The 30 minute only is for non-student activities and strictly enforced. The Visitor Day parking is for specific day use only with one day permits available at the front desk of the Administrative Building or in advance through the UCC Security Department. Disabled Person parking is available throughout the campus. Special stickers are required for parking in clearly marked Disabled Parking spaces. All handicapped spaces are clearly marked blue with signage. All stickers and placards required to park in these spaces are issued at the

Oregon Division of Motor Vehicles.

Traffic citations will be issued for improperly parked vehicles. The general parking fines range from \$25 to \$100. Any vehicle left unattended on UCC property for more than 72 consecutive hours will be deemed abandoned and towed at owner's expense. All traffic and parking issues should be addressed through the Director of Safety and Security located in the Security office.

SMOKING

Smoking or other tobacco usage is not permitted inside the perimeter of any Umpqua Community College (UCC) property. This includes all college sidewalks, landscaped areas, recreational areas, buildings on UCC property, and any leased or rental facilities. Designated smoking areas will be provided near parking lots on the outside perimeter of campus.

BUS SERVICE

UCC students can ride the bus at low-cost with a \$50 per term pass for Umpqua Transit, the "U". The passes can be purchased from the UCC Cashier, located in the Administration building.

The pass is good throughout the Umpqua Transit system, five days a week.

The service picks up and delivers daily to the UCC campus. The bus stop is located between Jacoby Auditorium and the Administration Building. Bus schedules are available in the Campus Center.

Security staff may be contacted 24 hours a day, seven days a week, by calling (541) 440-7777 or 7777 from any campus extension. In addition to providing a safe working and learning environment, Campus Security enforces traffic and parking regulations, promotes crime prevention and secures the college's buildings and facilities. Excellent communication with law enforcement agencies, particularly the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, is also maintained. Information relating to campus crime is collected annually and available upon request. Individuals on campus, including

students, employees, and visitors, should take active responsibility for their personal property. The college maintains its grounds and lighting to ensure the campus is as secure as possible.

The College Safety Committee meets monthly to address occupational safety and health issues. The purpose of the committee is to bring members of the college community together in a non-adversarial, cooperative effort to promote safety and health. Student representatives are members of the committee. The meetings are open to anyone.

ED 309 Advanced Practicum II & Seminar Early Childhood Development

1-3 credits - \$202.40/credit (CRN 1706)

ED 365 Children at Risk

3 Credits - \$607.20 (CRN 1705)

Explores stressful issues that impact the development of the whole child, including divorce, child abuse, moving, death of family members, changes in the family system, poverty, and cultural differences. Students research and apply knowledge to specific early childhood settings by planning curriculum and modifying classroom environments. Requires a case study of a child dealing with at least one stressful issue.

ED 399 Orientation to Early Childhood

1 Credit - \$55 (CRN 1706)

Introduction to the Early Childhood Program

ED 440/507 Whole Child Development

3 Credits - \$607.20/\$1275 (CRN 1939/1945)

Explores the study of child development from a holistic perspective. Students will gain an appreciation and respect for children as unique individuals of intrinsic worth and dignity. Emphasis will be on the skills of observation, reflection and interpretation as tools to learn about children and their development.

ED 407/507 Health/Safety/Nutrition in ECE

3 Credits - \$607.20/\$1275 (CRN 1718/1719)

Examines the physical and health issues of children from birth to age eight. Explore the multitude of decisions that families make regarding their child's health and well-being. Study the importance of prevention with regards to a child's health and safety. Heighten awareness of early signs, both visible and invisible, in children that may indicate a need for health interventions. Discuss the appropriate nutrition for children as well as the influences that school, home and society have on children's dietary habits.

ED 427/527 Child Abuse and Neglect

3 Credits - \$607/\$1275 (CRN 1711/1712)

Designed to give participants a foundation in the subjects of child abuse and neglect. Includes materials to create an awareness of child abuse and neglect and how to recognize the signs of abuse and neglect in students, as well as ways to respond, including awareness and requirements of the law. Examines society's role in abuse and neglect, the types of abuse and neglect children encounter, preventive measures a teacher can utilize, incidence in diverse populations, the role of the school, mandated reporting, working with parents and social service agencies, and the role of court-appointed special advocates.

ED 437 Science & the Young Child

3 Credits - \$607 (CRN 1713)

Utilizes science investigations common in an elementary classroom to deepen scientific understanding for the adult learner while also exploring the developing mind of the young child. Addresses current societal problems and the role of scientific and technological advances in finding solutions through project-based inquiry. Approved for University Studies (Integration - Strand H). Prerequisite: Completion of lower division University Studies requirements. Class restriction: Junior standing or above.

ED 480/580

Foundations in Early Childhood

3 Credits - \$607/\$1275 (CRN 1707/1710)

Introduces students to the field of early childhood and elementary education and presents an overview of historical and philosophical perspectives. Explores different approaches to ECE and elementary education. Analyzes relevant issues in the field of early childhood and elementary education from sociological and cultural perspectives.

ED 484/584**Curric Design in Early Childhood**

3 Credits - \$607/\$1275 (CRN 1714/1715)

Examines early childhood development and learning as a basis for determining developmentally appropriate experiences for young children. Incorporates observation and evaluation into organizing principles and considers the meaning and development of play and its importance in curriculum design. Examines relationships between the environment and program goals.

ED 493/593**Observation/Evaluation of Teaching**

3 Credits - \$607/\$1275 (CRN 1716/1717)

Provides an opportunity for experienced teachers to observe contemporary trends in education and applied learning theories as demonstrated in the schools. Analyzes learning theories, investigates trends and their use in classroom situations, and discusses the effectiveness of educational theories and practices on instruction.

ED 519 Action Research

3 Credits - \$1275 (CRN 1724)

Develops the educators' knowledge of appropriate action research techniques. Educators learn how to use action research as a reflective tool in assessing the effectiveness of their teaching practices in relationship to student learning. Participants create an action plan to implement in an educational setting.

ED 520 Professional Portfolio

3 Credits - \$1275 (CRN 1775)

The professional portfolio demonstrates the advanced knowledge, skills, and competencies required of students in the MEd/CTL Program. Students work individually with a faculty advisor to compile appropriate documentation over the course of their programs. Once they have completed the program and fulfilled all the requirements, students submit the final version of their portfolio via this course.

ED 521 ESOL Practicum

3 Credits - \$1275 (CRN 1725)

Provides practicum experience in an ESOL/bilingual classroom. Students work with second-language learners and are required to work closely with a mentor-teacher. Students also complete a work sample.

ED 533**Advanced Curriculum Work Sample**

3 Credits - \$1275 (CRN 1726)

Designed for previously licensed teachers who have fulfilled Oregon standard teacher licensure requirements. Working independently, candidates prepare a

teaching performance work sample consisting of a multi-week teaching unit. 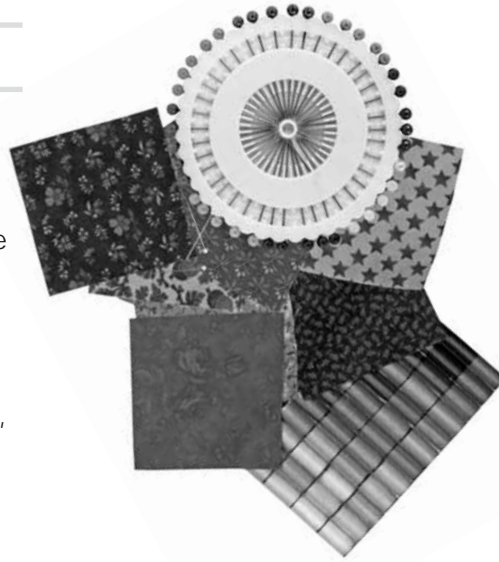

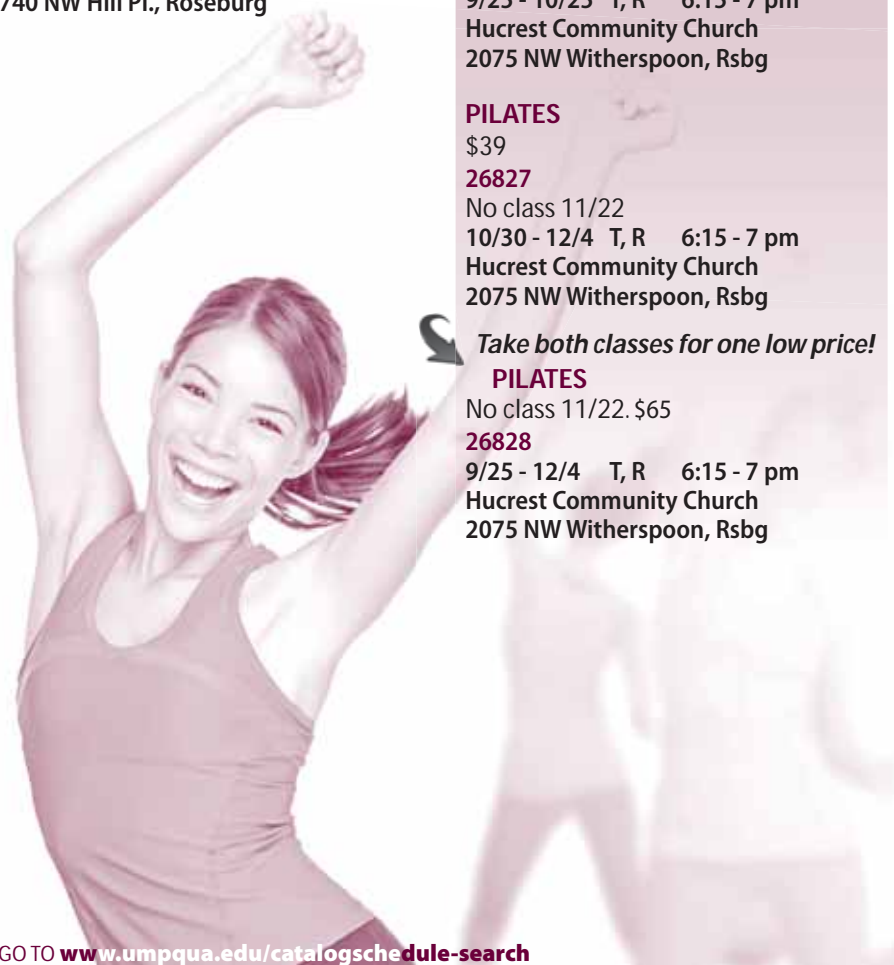

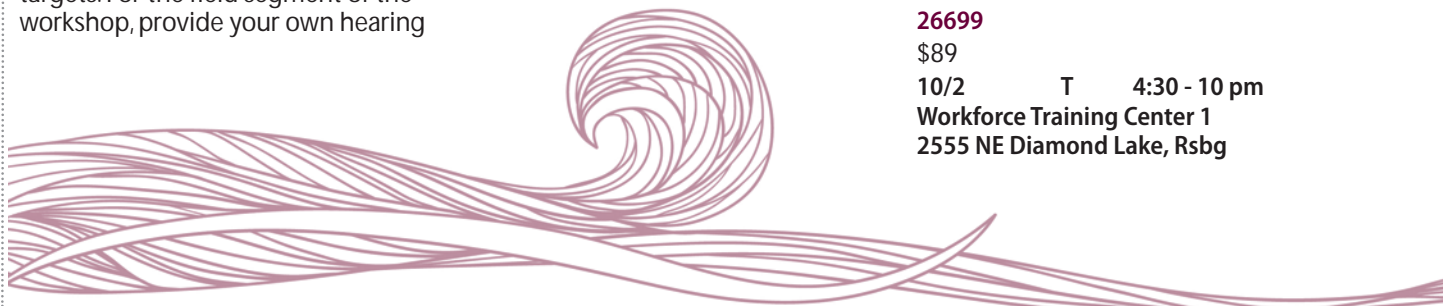

ADULT HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

Students may also earn an Adult High School Diploma through Umpqua Community College. The Woolley Center offers the majority of the high school diploma classes. These classes run four days a week in 5-½ week sessions. In addition to course work, adults may be eligible for high school credit from significant life experiences including work experience, military training, community service and homemaking. Classes are free for students on referral from an area high school, and \$27 per half credit for students paying their own way. WOOLLEY CENTER HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT CLASSES

The Woolley Center high school program focuses on college and career preparation. Statistics show that over 80 percent of jobs earning \$45,000 in Oregon require some post-secondary training: either a college degree or professional/technical certification. Yet many high school students graduate or drop out without a clear idea of what they will or can do next. The program addresses this by familiarizing students with high-growth occupations as well as local training opportunities. The goal is to kindle each student's natural interests and assist them to make plans for the future, whether they include college, vocational training, or something else altogether.

To ensure students learn up-to-date, real world information, they will hear business professionals, have job shadows and field trips, and complete hands-on projects and work samples. These experiences will become part of each student's portfolio, which in turn can be used for college admissions and job interviews. Students choose either a GED or Adult High School Diploma path. Class sizes are small, with an average of 15 students.

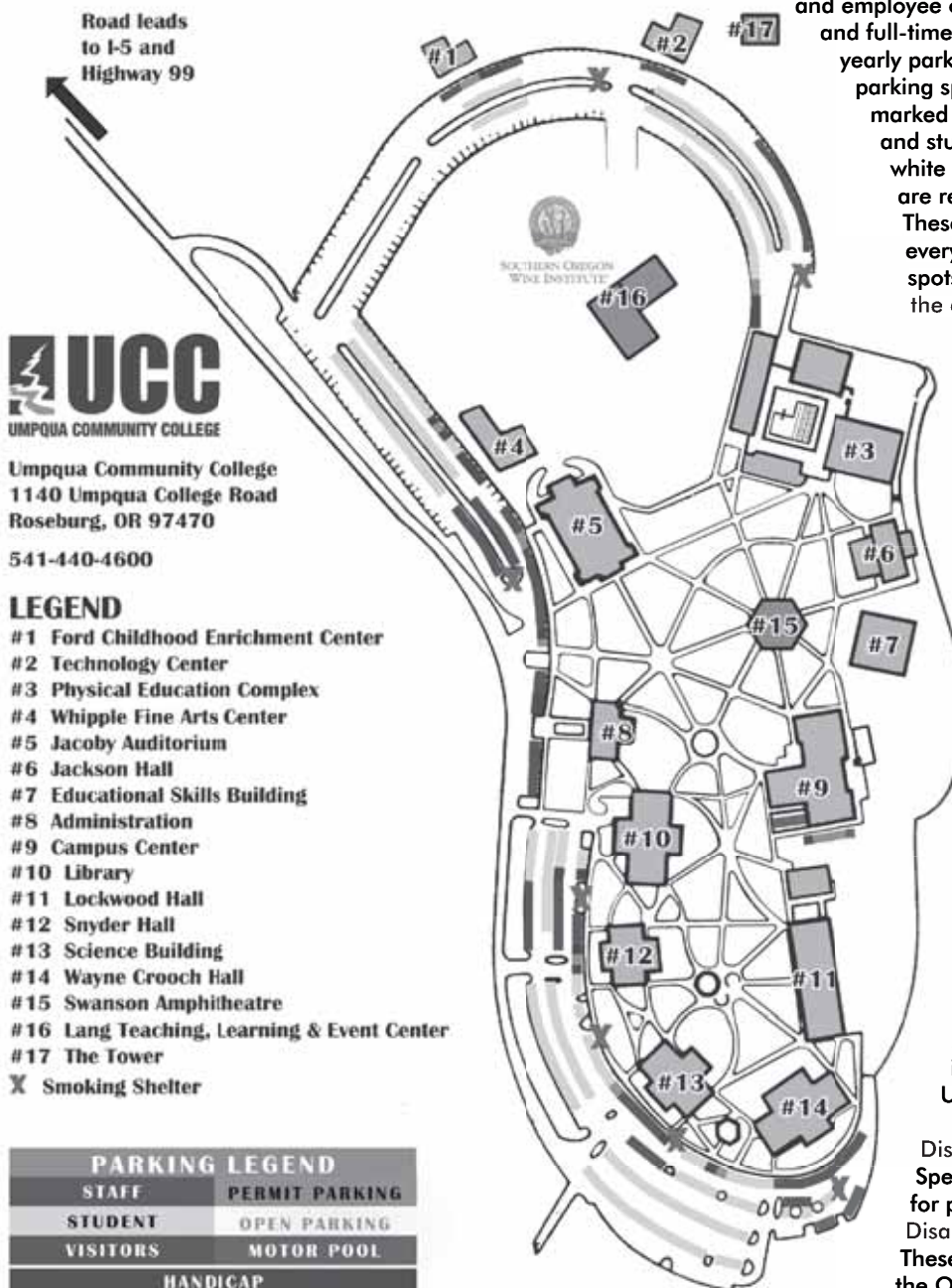
Parking

Umpqua Community College provides more than 450 parking spaces conveniently located near all the campus buildings. Of these, about 171 are assigned to college faculty and staff.

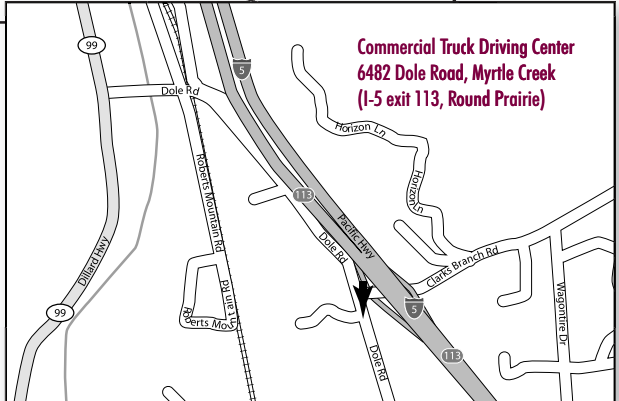
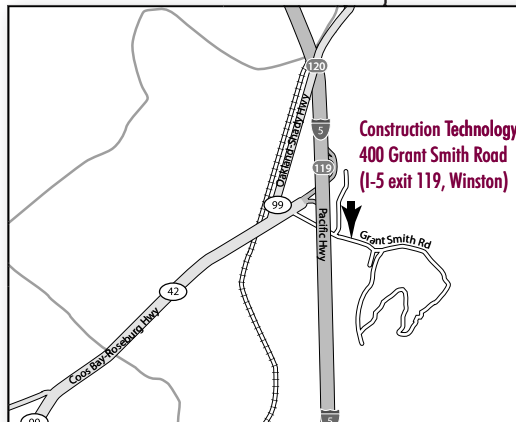
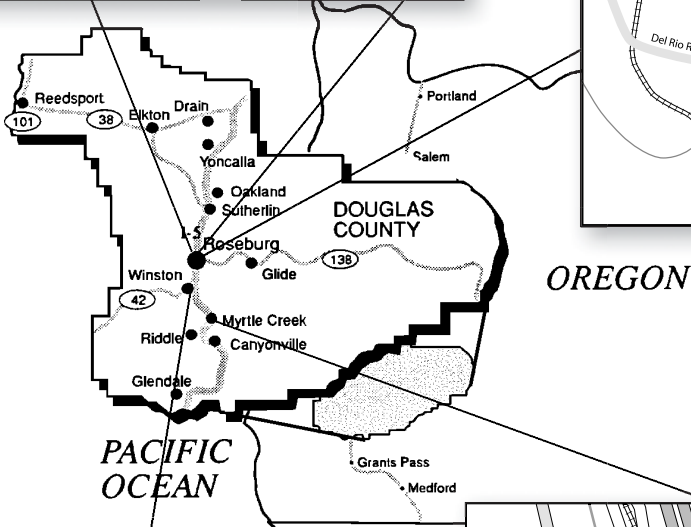
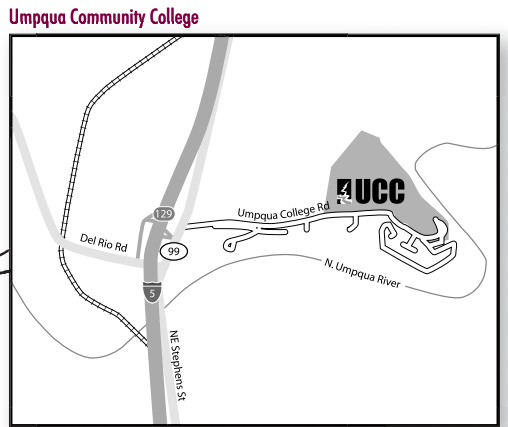
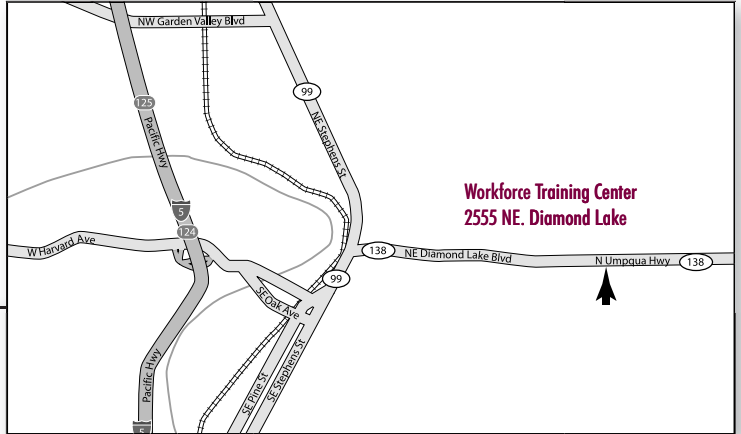
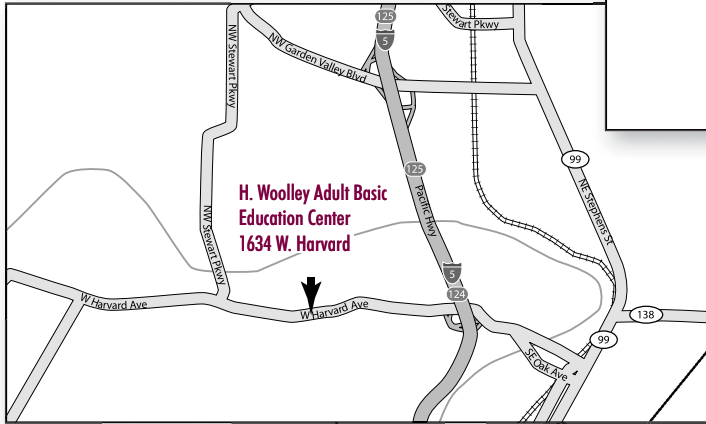
All employees are given a yearly parking permit. Designated parking spots for employees are marked by green lines, curbs and employee only signage. All part-time and full-time students also receive a yearly parking permit. Designated parking spots for students are marked by yellow lines, curbs and student only signage. All white marked lines and curbs are regarded as open parking. These spots are available to everyone. There are 14 parking spots clearly designated for the college Motor Pool and off limits to general parking. Red zones are usually fire related areas and are considered restricted lanes and zones with no parking allowed at any time.

Visitor Parking — Visitor parking is clearly divided into 2 separate areas. One area is 30 minute visitor only and the other is Visitor Day parking only. All areas are designated by purple curbs, lines, and signage. The 30 minute only is for non-student activities and strictly enforced. The Visitor Day parking is for specific day use only with one day permits available at the front desk of the Administrative Building or in advance through the UCC Security Department.

Disabled Person Parking — Special stickers are required for parking in clearly marked Disabled Parking spaces. These stickers are issued at the Oregon Division of Motor Vehicles.
