YOUR ROAD TO SUCCESS



Academic advisement offers assistance in course placement, selection and UCC program requirements. Term-by-term planners are designed by students with an advisor/counselor the 3rd, 4th and 5th week of each term for new and continuing students.

Individualized **career exploration** is available to help students get started on a successful career path. The opportunity to review current labor market information, utilize online career resources and/or take a career assessment with a professional interpretation is available to help find a career or major that fits an individual's interest.

Crisis counseling sessions are available to currently enrolled students. Up to three one-hour sessions focus on a specific plan of action, identification of community resources and referral for on-going personal counseling needs. No appointment is necessary.

WHAT MAKES WORKING AT A COMMUNITY college so gratifying, especially one with a locally-elected board, is the community at the heart of it.

It's from the community that we get our students. Our faculty and staff, as well. It's from the community that comes the energy that drives everything we do. From the community comes the people who lead our College on the Umpqua Community College Board of Trustees. More than 400 people from the trades, businesses and professions locally serve on advisory committees that keep the instruction in our career and technical programs current and relevant.

What a show of the strength and range of skills that are to be found in Douglas County.

Finally, and at long last, we are opening the Danny Lang teaching, Learning and Event Center, where our viticulture and enology classes will be conducted. Many of you who have come to campus recently or even driven over the Winchester Bridge heading north on I-5 have watched it rise on the hill above the campus.

Did you know that 87 percent of all of the construction costs spent to build the architecturally-significant Lang Center went to pay workers, contractors and vendors found right here in Douglas County?

UCC is committed to the economic development of Douglas County. That, coupled with intellectual achievement and educational attainment, is our only reason for being. We know we are a cultural hub, too. The Lang Center, along with the entire faculty, staff and physical plant, plays a role there, as well.

Some 250 individuals, families, foundations and other organizations contributed more than \$2.5 million to construct this beautiful and functional building. More than 200 workers, residing largely in Douglas County, from 60 contractors, subcontractors and vendors worked on making the Lang Center what it is for our students, faculty and the public.

From UCC's beginnings, more than 45 years ago, this is the way the people of Douglas County have wanted to proceed.

More recently, in an effort to get our economy going, the 2009 state Legislature supplied UCC with \$4 million in stimulus money, and gave proportional amounts to other entities statewide. At that time, UCC made the repairs, upgrades and safety modifications the campus so badly needed with workers and contractors taken largely from Douglas County. This was true for all but one or two of the jobs we completed with that money. In the remaining cases, we endeavored to hire from within Oregon.

On May 15, Umpqua Community College will present its first bond levy request to the voters since 1998. UCC will request authorization for \$40 million in bonding authority to build an Allied Health & Science Center on a site adjacent Jacoby Auditorium, an Industrial Arts & Technology Training Center on the site behind the Tech Building in the eastern portion of the campus and a satellite campus facility near South Umpqua High School. The money from the sale of those bonds will also remodel vacated spaces in Wayne Crooch Hall, the Science Building and Lockwood Hall.

In 2009, UCC received an \$8.5 million matching funds from the State of Oregon for the Allied Health & Science Building which would serve the nursing and dental programs and all of the science programs. UCC is seeking an additional \$8.5 million more from the 2013 Oregon Legislature for the Industrial Arts & Technology Training Center.

In an extra effort to ensure local partnership with contractors and vendors, the College will assemble a bond oversight committee. Throughout this process, including the construction of these buildings, the workers, the people, the voters of Douglas County will continue to imbue the College with its vitality and direction.

5. Review the college catalog and this Schedule of Classes to become familiar with important dates, policies, procedures, rights and responsibilities as well as selection of classes.
6. Attend New Student Orientation.

WHO MAY ENROLL?

UCC has an “open door” policy and will admit students who meet any one of the following entrance requirements:

- Graduates from an accredited secondary school.
- Individuals who have earned the GED Certificate of Equivalency or an Adult High School Diploma.
- Non-high school graduates who are 18 years old or over and whose high school class has graduated.
- Individuals who are 16 or 17 years old who are not required to attend high school and who furnish a written “Release from Compulsory School Attendance” may make application as a special student (ORS 339.030).
- Students who are attending high school as juniors or seniors who present written approval from their school officials. Course load must be approved by both schools.
- Some programs have special program requirements other than listed above.

If you are a citizen of another country you must meet certain federal immigration and college requirements before admittance to Umpqua Community College. International students can request special application materials from the UCC website.

Non-credit students are not required to submit a formal application.

STEPS FOR NEW CREDIT STUDENTS

1. **Application**
 - A. Complete an application in the Campus Center Admissions Office or download a copy at www.umpqua.edu, and pay the \$25 application fee.

At the same time:

- B. Students interested in Financial Aid should contact the Financial Aid Office and begin the application process.
 - C. Submit official transcripts from other college(s) to UCC Admissions.
2. **Placement Test**

Take the free placement test, which is offered on a walk-in basis in the Advising and Career Service Center located in the Campus Center. Fees will be charged for re-testing.
 3. **Advising**

A. Following the placement test, an academic advisor will interpret the results, answer questions and help schedule classes. A professional advisor will answer additional questions you may have regarding

starting college, college resources and your career options. Professional counselors are also available to all students to assist with personal issues, which may be barriers to college success. The placement test, transcribed college courses, and recommendations from instructors may be used to place you in the appropriate classes.

- B. Next you will meet with a member of your new academic department to get acquainted and to learn more about your major. A department representative will review and approve your schedule so you may register.
4. **Registration**

Register on a walk-in basis and make arrangements to pay for classes (See the academic calendar printed each term in the class schedule, and on the web for dates and deadlines.)
 5. **Orientation**

Attend New Student Orientation Workshop. Check online for days and times.

RETURNING CREDIT STUDENTS

(degree seeking) Students not absent for more than one year.

1. The Advising Center will assist you to develop a schedule on a walk-in basis. A Term-by-Term Planner must be completed prior to registering for a second term or if you have changed your major.
2. If you plan to receive financial aid, check with the staff in the Financial Aid Office. If you are to receive veterans benefits, see the Veterans Coordinator. Remember, it takes 6-8 weeks to verify eligibility.
3. Continuing credit students who haven't been absent for more than a year may register by web or walk-in registration.
4. Continuing credit students who have been absent for more than one year must readmit before registering. (No charge for re-admission).

EARLY REGISTRATION AND PAYMENT

When a student registers early for a subsequent quarter or quarters, you are agreeing to pay the tuition and fees due.

If you have no schedule changes, you may mail your check (with student name and identification number), or drop off the check at the Cashier's Office by the dates listed for each term.

PAYMENT OF TUITION AND FEES

Tuition and Fees for Spring Term may be paid in one of the following ways:

1. Payment in full or online payment plan **by March 29**.
2. Approved Financial Aid.

Registration **AFTER March 29** must be accompanied by payment in full or online payment plan.

Failure to pay may result in being dropped from classes.

Any unpaid debts will be put into the collections process thirty days after the end of the quarter. Appeals may be submitted to the Finance Office.

Other Financial Resources

Students who are receiving financial assistance from sources outside of the college must work with the source to meet the deadlines required by the UCC registration system.

OUTSTANDING FINES / DEBTS

If you owe library fines or other monies to the college, you will not be allowed to register until all such debts have been cleared through the college Cashier's Office.

CANCELLATION OF CLASSES

The college reserves the right to cancel any class because of extenuating circumstances, such as low enrollment.

REFUNDS

Credit Tuition Refunds

Students who withdraw from one or more UCC courses and who have complied with regulations governing withdrawals are entitled to certain refunds of tuition depending on the time of withdrawal. Refunds are limited to students who comply with withdrawal procedures. See Withdrawals in the college catalog on the website at www.umpqua.edu/acadlink.htm. Full tuition is refunded if withdrawal is made by the end of the last working day the first week of fall, winter, spring and summer quarters. For courses meeting less than 10 weeks the refund is prorated by the Registrar. No tuition refund will be made if withdrawal is made after these times.

Refunds in all cases are calculated from the date of application for a refund.

It is not calculated from the date a student ceases to attend classes. The only exception is in an unusual case where delay occurred for reasons beyond the student's control. Students will receive full tuition refunds for courses cancelled, when appropriate.

Credit Fee Refunds

Full fees for credit classes shall be refunded if withdrawal is made during the first week of class. No fees shall be refunded if withdrawal is after the first week.

Fee refunds in all cases are calculated from the date of the application for refund. They are not calculated from the date the student ceases to attend.

FINANCIAL AID

There are four major types of aid: grants, scholarships, student loans, and work-study. Grants and scholarships do not require repayment. Loans require repayment with interest. Work-study requires that the student accept a job placement and perform work responsibilities to receive a monthly paycheck. Students receiving funds are required to be enrolled in classes and must meet the financial aid Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy. Copies of this policy are available online at <http://www.umpqua.edu/formPubs/finaid/sap.pdf>.

Students must apply for financial aid every year by filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA may be submitted as early as January for the following academic year beginning with the summer term and ending with the spring term. In general, it is best to apply as early as possible. Applications are processed in the order they are completed.

If you apply for financial aid, standardized costs for tuition and books, room and board, transportation, and personal expenses will be used to determine a cost of attendance. This cost along with the information provided by your submission of the FAFSA and any other requested information will be used to calculate your eligibility for funds. Financial aid funds are awarded to students on the basis of fund availability and standardized federal formulas.

Applying for financial aid can be a time-consuming process. Your quick response to our requests can shorten the process. Forms or information returned late will slow or stop the process of determining your eligibility. As some funding is limited and is awarded on a first-completed-first-

served basis, your delay may limit the types and amount of aid you receive. If you apply late, your financial aid may not be ready at the beginning of a term and you may need to pay for your tuition, fees, and books on your own (see "Payment plan" section for payment option) and have your financial aid reimburse you when you have been awarded.

Notification of financial aid awards are e-mailed to your college e-mail address. To ensure your right to privacy, information regarding awards to students is not available using the telephone or internet. Information regarding the status of your application and award can be accessed through Riverhawk Web. If you need assistance in gaining that access please contact the help desk, 541-440-7808.

UCC reserves the right to adjust student aid funds based on changes in anticipated cost of education, enrollment status, other student resources, and the availability of funds.

VETERANS SERVICES

The Veterans Education Services Office was established to provide service to veterans and their eligible dependents in applying for and receiving Veterans Administration educational benefits, VA work study, and other supportive services. You are encouraged to contact the Veterans Coordinator in the Campus Center Building for assistance.

PLACEMENT TEST

The placement test is required for all credit students. It is given on a walk-in basis in Testing Services, which is located in the Campus Center building. The placement test is an assessment tool which indicates the entry level of math, reading, and writing for each student. Placement test scores are valid for one year.

The initial cost of the placement fee is included in a new student admission fee. Retests are \$6 per section.

The placement test is not required of transfer students who have had their official transcripts from other colleges sent and evaluated by UCC and have successfully completed a math and writing course at other colleges.

DROPS / WITHDRAWALS

Students registered for classes are considered to be in attendance. Students discontinuing attendance without filing the official drop/withdrawal form in the Registration Office may receive a failing grade. Recipients of Title IV financial aid funds are subject to the federal regulations for withdrawals from classes for a term.

Students wishing to drop/delete (which does not appear on the academic transcript) from a course or courses must initiate the withdrawal procedure during the first 5 instructional days of each

quarter, except for classes less than ten weeks in length. Complete and file the appropriate form in the Registration Office. After 5 days, the following withdrawal (appears on the academic transcript as a "W") procedures must be followed.

WITHDRAWAL FROM UCC

To withdraw from all courses, get the signatures of a counselor and Financial Aid. The withdrawal form may be obtained in the Registration Office and must be completed and filed in the Registration Office.

WITHDRAWAL BY INSTRUCTOR

Students who register for a class but do not attend the first class meeting, or contact the instructor before the first class meeting of the term may be withdrawn by the instructor.

STUDENT EDUCATIONAL RECORDS

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), also known as the Buckley Amendment, covers the release and inspection of each student's educational records. In compliance with FERPA, Umpqua Community College has formulated the Student Records Policy to outline the proper handling and release of student educational records. See the catalog on the website at www.umpqua.edu/FormPubs?FormPubs.htm.

DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Umpqua Community College defines certain information as Directory Information, and this information may be released to a third party upon a written request. Students may sign a Directory Information Hold Form which will prevent the release of this information. Students who sign the request will not be listed in news releases concerning honor rolls, or in commencement related publications.

DISABILITY SERVICES

Disability Services advocates for and empowers students with disabilities through the provision of information, services, skill development, problem solving and self-advocacy to reach their full personal, academic and vocational potential.

Students with disabilities will find UCC's campus to be accessible and accommodating. A variety of support services are available to students with any type of disability. Disability-related accommodations for admission, financial

aid and placement test are available upon request through our office. Returning students are encouraged to submit accommodation requests for ongoing services prior to the new term beginning.

Student Accident and Sickness Insurance is an important component of your ability to continue your education. A serious injury or illness could interrupt your education plans by diverting necessary funds for educational expenses to medical expenses. Umpqua Community College offers a Student Accident and Sickness Plan, serviced by Insurance Benefits, LLC, Bruce Ricks & Associates. The plan is designed to provide an excellent level of insurance protection, at an affordable cost. Enrolling in the plan is voluntary. GED CLASSES

GED classes are close to home, so you can save time. They are held in Glendale, Canyonville, Riddle, Tri City, Glide, Drain, and Roseburg. Tuition is \$42 per class per term. Call 541-440-4603 to register or to find out exact times and locations.

GED TESTING

You can take the GED test for \$85. Call Testing Services at 541-440-4610 (voice) to schedule the test (541-440-4626 TDD).

LIBRARY

Hours generally: 7:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, and 1 to 4 p.m. most Saturdays. Closed Fridays and Saturdays during the summer. Hours vary between terms. Call 541-440-4640 for information and hours. Online: www.ucclibrary.com.

BOOKSTORE

The UCC Bookstore is located in the Campus Center Building, on the main campus. The Bookstore offers course textbooks, general books, computer software and hardware, clothing, gifts, cards, snacks, and a wide variety of school supplies.

Bookstore hours are 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, for the fall, winter, and spring terms. Summer hours are 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

During the fall, winter and spring terms, the Bookstore will be open until 6 p.m. the first two days of classes. Please plan on bringing your class schedule to ensure the purchase of the correct textbooks for your classes.

You can now purchase textbooks online through the UCC Bookstore website with a Visa or Mastercard. Allow a 24 hour ship time and only street addresses will be accepted. NO PO BOXES.

The Bookstore also rents textbooks from an affiliate site through the Bookstore webpage www.umpqua.edu/bookstore. Textbooks purchased during the term may be returned until the end of the first week of school, providing the textbook is in the same condition as purchased and proof you dropped the class and a receipt for the item is provided. Textbooks or software in shrinkwrap, labeled "no-return if opened" may be returned for a refund at this time if un-opened. Opened items may be eligible to sell at the buy-back at the end of the term.

The UCC Bookstore will have a textbook buy-back during the last three days of finals week during fall, winter and spring terms. A limited buy-back will be held during the end of summer term. Textbooks eligible for book buy-back usually include texts that will be used the next term on our campus. The textbook buyer also buys for other schools on a supply and demand basis. Price paid at buy-back varies with each book, but can be as much as one half the amount paid. The UCC Bookstore is a non-profit self-sustaining operation owned by Umpqua Community College.

STUDENT ID CARDS

All registered students are entitled to an ID card. The ID card serves as your official UCC photo identification and can be utilized as a UCC Library Card. A student ID card is required in order to get a parking permit. ID cards are available from the Student Life Office; call 541-440-7749 for ID processing hours. ID cards must be validated each quarter you are enrolled; validation stickers are available from the Information Desk, located in the Campus Center; from the Cashier, located in the Administration building, and the Student Life Office, located in Campus Center.

PARKING

Umpqua Community College provides more than 1,450 parking spaces located near all campus buildings. Of these, 171 are designated to all part-time and full-time employees. All employees are given a yearly parking permit. Designated parking spots for employees are marked by green lines, curbs and employee only signage. All part-time and full-time students also receive a yearly parking permit. Parking permits are available from the Information Desk in the Campus Center. A student ID card is required in order to get a parking permit. Permits must be placed inside the car on the lower left corner of the front windshield. Designated parking spots for students are marked by yellow lines, curbs and student only signage. All white marked lines and curbs are regarded as open parking. These spots are available to everyone. There are 14 parking spots clearly designated for the college Motor Pool and off limits to general parking. Red zones are usually fire related areas and are considered restricted lanes and zones with no parking allowed at any time. Visitor parking is clearly divided into 2 separate areas. One area is 30 minute visitor only and the other is Visitor Day parking only. All areas are designated by purple curbs, lines, and signage. The 30 minute only is for non-student activities and strictly enforced. The Visitor Day parking is for specific day use only with one day permits available at the front desk of the Administrative Building or in advance through the UCC Security Department. Disabled Person parking is available throughout the campus. Special stickers are required for parking in clearly marked Disabled Parking spaces. All handicapped spaces are clearly marked blue with signage. All stickers and placards required

to park in these spaces are issued at the Oregon Division of Motor Vehicles.

Traffic citations will be issued for improperly parked vehicles. The general parking fines range from \$25 to \$100. Any vehicle left unattended on UCC property for more than 72 consecutive hours will be deemed abandoned and towed at owner's expense. All traffic and parking issues should be addressed through the Director of Safety and Security located in the Security office.

SMOKING

Smoking or other tobacco usage is not permitted inside the perimeter of any Umpqua Community College (UCC) property. This includes all college sidewalks, landscaped areas, recreational areas, buildings on UCC property, and any leased or rental facilities. Designated smoking areas will be provided near parking lots on the outside perimeter of campus.

BUS SERVICE

UCC students can ride the bus at low-cost with a \$45 per term pass for Umpqua Transit, the "U". The passes can be purchased from the UCC Cashier, located in the Administration building.

The pass is good throughout the Umpqua Transit system, five days a week.

The service picks up and delivers daily to the UCC campus. The bus stop is located between Jacoby Auditorium and the Administration Building. Bus schedules are available in the Campus Center.

In addition to providing a safe working and learning environment, Campus Security enforces traffic and parking regulations, promotes crime prevention and secures the college's buildings and facilities. Excellent communication with law enforcement agencies, particularly the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, is also

maintained. Information relating to campus crime is collected annually and available upon request.

Individuals on campus, including students, employees, and visitors, should take active responsibility for their personal property. The college maintains its grounds and lighting to ensure the campus is as secure as possible. The College Safety Committee meets monthly to address occupational safety and health issues. The purpose of the committee is to bring members of the college community together in a non-adversarial, cooperative effort to promote safety and health. Student representatives are members of the committee. The meetings are open to anyone.



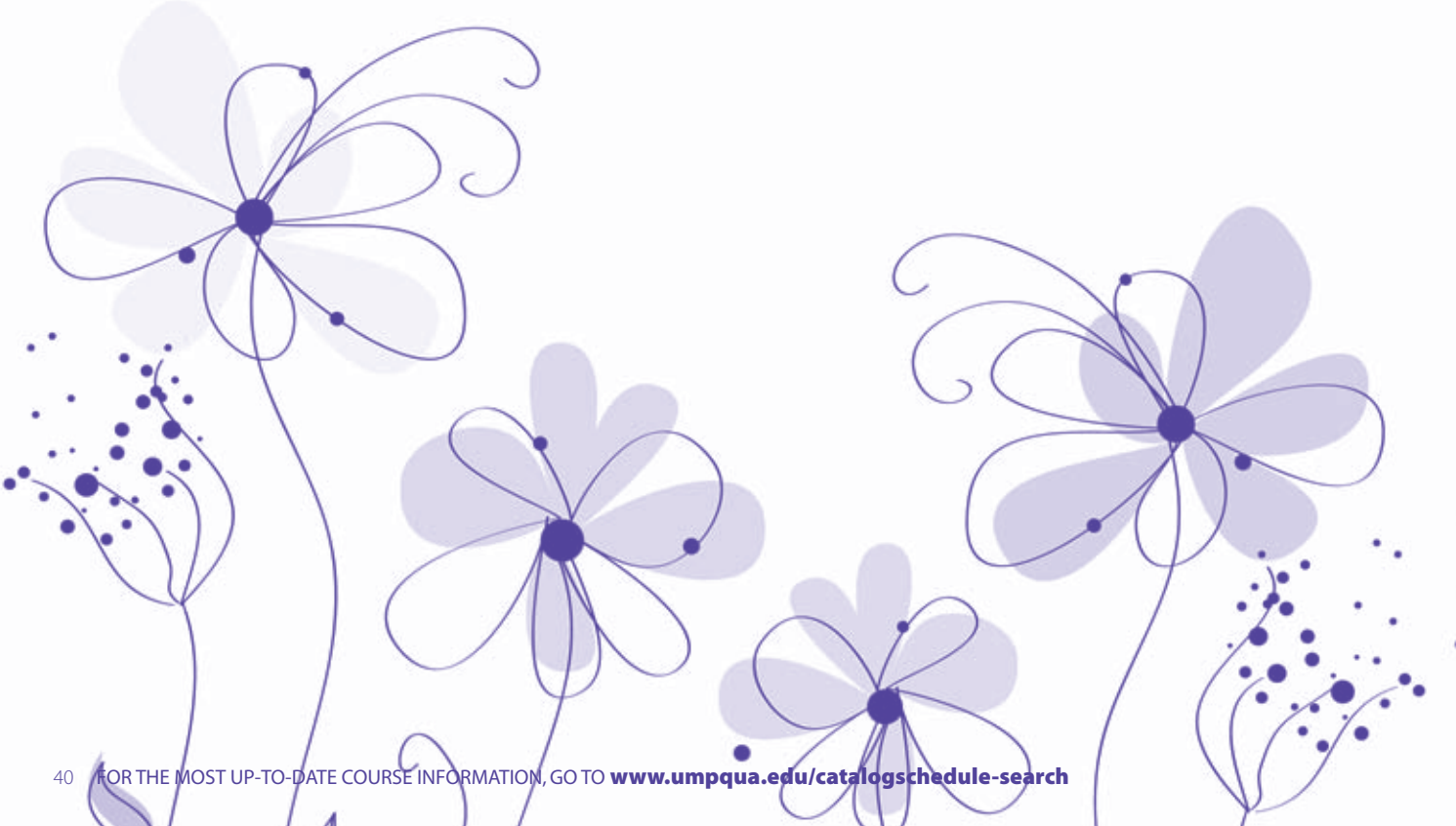
REGISTRATION AND REQUIREMENTS & REGISTRATION

- Classes geared toward motivated, self-starting students, able to accomplish required class work independently.
- Requirements: web browser software, internet connection, word processing program, and an email account.
- Online classes require more from the student than traditional classes. To help you determine if an online class is right for you, try the following survey available on the internet at http://www.cod.edu/dept/CIL/CIL_Surv.htm.
- Registration for these classes identical to on-campus classes. February 21 – continuing students; March 5 – new and returning students.
- UCC classes do have varying requirements for face-to-face meetings (generally no more than 3 meetings during the term).
- Textbook requirements are identical to on-campus classes and can be purchased at the UCC bookstore.
- Tuition is \$79.50 per credit. Additional charges: registration fee of \$20 per term, online fee of \$25 per term for online classes; hybrid fee of \$15 per term for hybrid classes, and the cost of textbooks. (Tuition and fees are subject to change.)
- All courses are taught using Angel, which can be accessed through UCC's main page or directly at <http://angel.umpqua.edu>. Included are tutorials that can be accessed at any time on how to use the ANGEL program. Online course schedule is identical to campus schedule.
- Online Orientation sessions will be offered Monday and Tuesday, April 2, 2012 and April 3, 2012. Sessions are scheduled from 3 - 4 p.m. either Monday or Tuesday, or 6-7 p.m. either Monday or Tuesday in TC 119/120. You need to attend only one session. Online orientation questions? 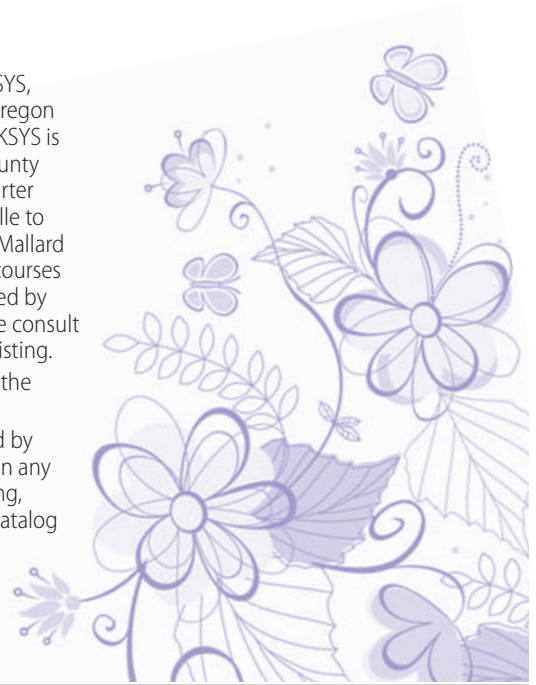

ED 309

ECE Practicum

1-3 credits - \$190/credit (cm 6316)

ED 385 Early Childhood Professional

3 credits - \$570 (cm 6318)

Explores issues related to professional conduct and the development of professional philosophy. Topics include professionalism, historical and current factors, early childhood education programs, parent interaction, job opportunities, ethical and legal issues, and community resources. Students research and apply information to a particular early childhood issue. Requires students to complete a project enabling them to directly participate in professional activities in the early childhood community.

ED 399

Orientation to ECD

1 credit - \$55 (cm 6317)

ED 407/507

Early Intervention in Family Services

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (cm 6324/6325)

EI/ECSE personnel recognize the family as the major long-term influence in a child’s life. This class will explore ways to support and be responsive to families within an educational context. Family relationships and how a disability can affect that relationship will be examined. Implementing culturally appropriate family guided services for young children will be an additional focus.

ED 407/507

Differentiated Curriculum in the Inclusive Classroom/TAG

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (cm 6326/6327)

The course is designed for the inclusive classroom teacher, emphasizing models and methods of differentiating curriculum for students with a focus on the talented and gifted, and addressing a variety of exceptionalities including dual exceptionalities, and high/low incidence disabilities recognized by federal law. The educational needs of the inclusive population will be framed within the requirements of Oregon state and federal law. Strategies and techniques of differentiating and individualizing instruction and resource utilization are examined in depth. The topics of community involvement and parent education are included.

ED 407/507

Early Intervention Curriculum Content

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (cm 6328/6329)

This course will present the range of strategies and techniques for working with children with exceptionalities, birth through age 5. Included are stages of play, theory, and research on play, cultural differences in play, and adult role in facilitation of play; knowledge and skills for developing early literacy skills for young children birth-primary grades; and design and implementation learning opportunities, child-focused strategies and other intervention methods.

ED 407/507

Global Education

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (cm 6640/6300)

This course examines various aims of global education and surveys curricula and instructional methods associated with each. Students grapple with questions such as: What does it mean to be “globally literate”? What benefits and challenges await students as they attempt to analyze events and issues from diverse perspectives? What global issues must students be prepared to confront as citizens in the 21st century? What resources are available to educators as they attempt to integrate global issues into the k-12 curriculum? By the end of the course, students will produce a global education curriculum plan for application within a k-12 classroom setting.

ED 437/507

Science and the Young Child

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (cm 6323)

Scientific Inquiry in Teaching explores how adults can be challenged to uncover their own scientific understandings and viewpoints through science discoveries designed for children in elementary school. These scientific explorations will be a vehicle by which students develop an understanding of their own conceptual framework on research, experimentation, and knowledge construction as they consider the developing mind of the young child. Using scientific inquiry to study cognitive development in adults and children will highlight research-based best practices in teaching. An overarching goal for this course is to demonstrate how

students with a developmental foundation in science and the ability to use inquiry as a method for answering questions will make educated decisions affecting society. The online format of this course integrates computer technology into the realm of science pedagogy.

ED 454/545**Leadership & Advocacy in ECE**

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (crn 6319/6585)

Course examines literature and research related to leadership, advocacy and current issues influencing the early care and education of children. Students develop their rationale for evaluative practices, reflection and the articulation of their philosophy and views on controversial topics. Small group work is designed to provide experience in collaboration and group processes.

ED 489/589**Interpersonal Relationships/
Group Guidance**

3 credits - \$570/\$1245 (crn 6321/6589)

Focuses on understanding social and emotional development as a basis for effective group management and positive interpersonal relations. Examines different theories of group management and their relationships to curriculum design. Considers ways to foster positive interactions between children and adults.

ED 519**Action Research as an Approach
to School Improvement**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6529)

Develops knowledge and skills in appropriate action research techniques. Participants develop an action research proposal that may be implemented in their schools or classrooms and may also be appropriate for submission to grant agencies for funding.

ED 520**Professional Portfolio**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6547)

The professional portfolio demonstrates the advanced knowledge, skills, and competencies required of students in the MEd/CTL Program. Students work individually with a faculty advisor to compile appropriate documentation over the course of their programs. Once they have completed the program and fulfilled all the requirements, students submit the final version of their portfolio via this course.

ED 521**Field-Based Practicum – ESOL**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6549)

Provides practicum experience in an ESOL/bilingual classroom. Students work with second-language learners and are required to work closely with a mentor-teacher. Students also complete a work sample.

ED 523**Issues of Educational Reform**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6550)

Introduces students to areas of educational reform, restructuring, and change. Includes international, national, state, and local reform efforts and research into educational change. Provides personal strategies for promoting and coping with educational change efforts.

ED 533**Advanced Curriculum Work Sample**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6551)

Designed for previously licensed teachers who have fulfilled Oregon standard teacher licensure requirements. Working independently, candidates prepare a teaching performance work sample consisting of a multiweek teaching unit. The written work sample must include unit goals, lesson plans, pre- and post-instruction student performance data, interpretation of learning gains, and modifications in response to student progress. Students negotiate an individualized meeting and progress schedule with the instructor.

ED 544**Strategies & Materials for Second
Language Learners**

3 credits - \$1245 (6553)

Equips teachers with a range of effective instructional methodologies for facilitating learning among language-minority students. Examines innovative materials for developing culturally appropriate learning experiences. Presents approaches to instruction in specific content areas (reading, writing, mathematics, science, and social studies). Examines and integrates the use of current technology to enhance instruction for second-language learners.

ED 549**ESOL/Bilingual Portfolio**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6555)

Participants in the ESOL/Bilingual Endorsement Program document their understanding and competency through the development of a professional portfolio. Includes information on professional portfolios and format options for documenting the required competencies. Establishes standards for quality. The instructor works individually with students to facilitate the development of a thorough accumulation and presentation of evidence regarding each of the competencies.

ED 561**Advanced Educational Psychology**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6556)

Examines major theories of learning and measures current issues and educational practices against a continuum of theories in educational psychology. Engages students in research and development related to theoretical frameworks in educational psychology. Analyzes problems encountered in providing equal and appropriate education to minorities, the culturally different, and the disabled.

ED 570**The Exceptional Child**

3 credits - \$1245 (crn 6564)

Examines the special educational needs of children classified as exceptional. Analyzes the legal requirements of mainstreaming and special programs. Covers the practical aspects of providing or adapting materials, curriculum, and teaching techniques. Studies the affective domain of exceptionality and strategies to help children develop to their fullest potential.

READ 509 Practicum

3 credits - \$1077 (crn 6637)

READ 570 Classroom**Assessment/Reading**

3 credits - \$1077 (6639)

Provides teachers an understanding of issues related to reading instruction and assessment. Practicing educators are provided research-validated strategies and assessment tools to inform instruction, meet the needs of individual learners, and develop an understanding

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of the issues related to effective reading instruction. Focuses on the integral relationship between informal classroom assessments and effective instructional strategies within the context of a balanced reading approach.

Prerequisite(s): Learners are assumed to be teachers with access to students in the PK–12 grade level.

READ 581**Action Research - Leadership in Literacy**

3 credits - \$1077 (crn 6638)

Develops knowledge and skills in appropriate action research techniques. Participants develop an action research proposal that may be implemented in their schools or classrooms and may also be appropriate for submission to grant agencies for funding. Prerequisite: Learners are assumed to be teachers with access to elementary and/or secondary students.

SPED 511**Internship: Dual Endorsement Candidates**

6-14 credits - \$415/credit (crn 6841)

The culminating experience for interns in the Dual Endorsement Special Education Program. Successful candidates will be endorsed to teach in both special education and general education settings. A half-day, full-term internship experience designed to give the intern maximum opportunity to direct and manage a special education setting to which they are assigned. When appropriate, interns assume total responsibility for student instruction, scheduling, management, and mainstreaming, as well as working with classroom assistants, parents, volunteers, and regular education staff whenever possible.

SPED 555**Advanced Legal Issues**

3 credits - \$1245 (6844)

Expands a good basic understanding of special education law through investigating case law and current controversial issues in legal matters. Includes case analysis, reading of legal briefs, application of state and federal law to district practice, and preparation techniques for due process hearings.

TWO-WAY VIDEO**ED 543****Foundations in Second Language Education (crn 6599)**

Tues., 4:30-7:20 p.m.
Lockwood Hall, Room 2
3 credits
UCC Campus

Examines philosophies and practices in teaching language-minority students. Studies bilingualism and biculturalism from psychological, social, and political standpoints. Analyzes program models, as well as the theories and philosophies underlying these models. Provides an understanding of the laws pertaining to educating second-language learners and current theory and research in the fields of ESOL and bilingual education.

ED 548**Culture/Family/Community Involvement (ESOL) (crn 7267)**

Thurs., 4-7 p.m.
Lockwood Hall, Room 2
3 credits
UCC Campus

Focuses on parent and community involvement in schools. Presents strategies for building strong partnerships among parents, teachers, students, and community members. A study of the differences between school culture and the diverse cultures represented by children and families provides a foundation for learning methods and programs that promote cooperation and collaboration among the school, family, and community. Considers communication strategies among school personnel and families with limited English proficiency.

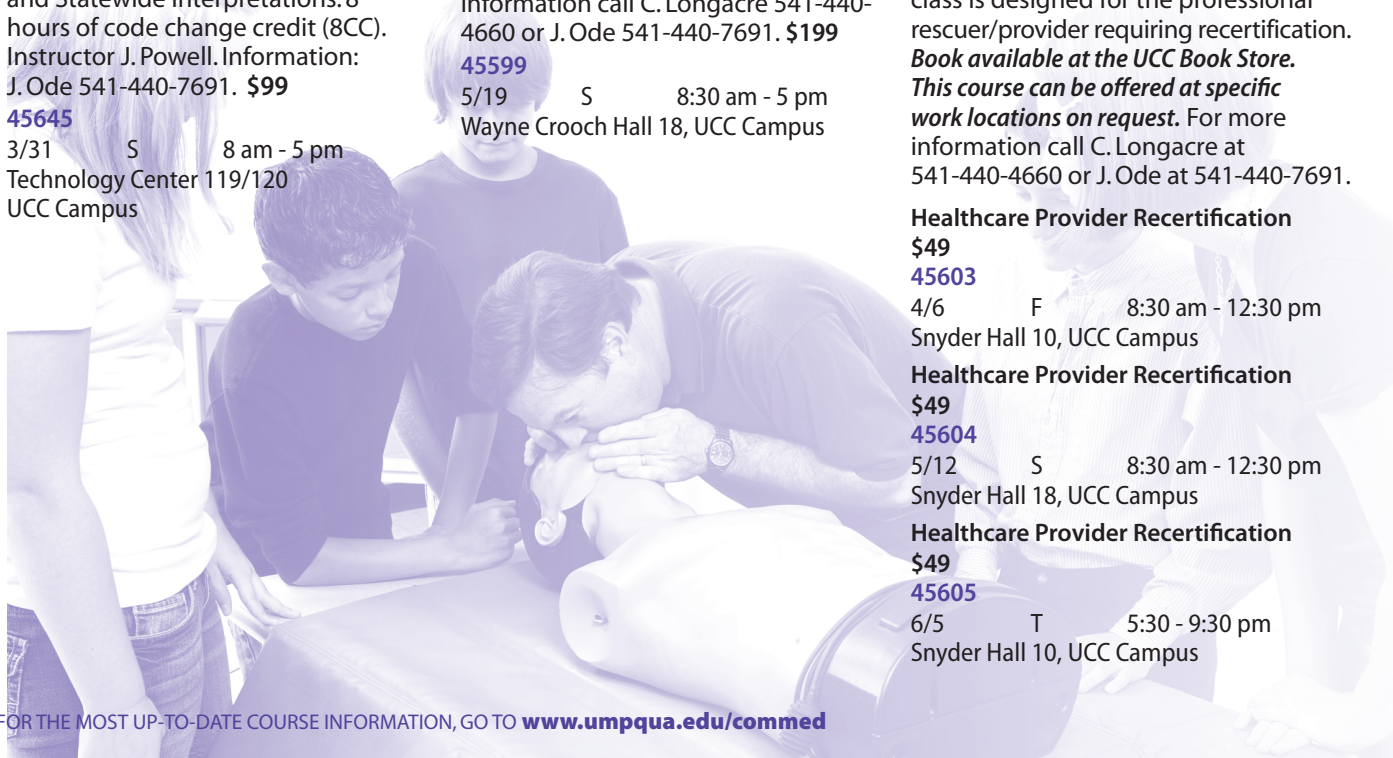

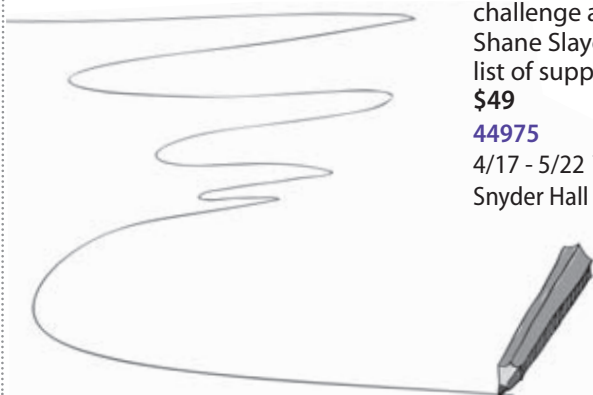

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REGISTRATION POLICIES & PROCEDURES

UCC Community Education Classes are open to the public. Classes are open to students 16 years and older unless otherwise stated. Youth and Family classes are specifically designed for young people, teens, or families. Community Education classes are separate from credit offerings and do not count towards degrees, diplomas, or certificate programs.

PAYMENT

Payment is due at time of registration. Make checks payable to UCC. Visa or MasterCard are accepted. Students are not allowed to register for UCC classes if library fines or other outstanding monies are owed to the College. Debts may be cleared through the Umpqua Community College Finance Office.

REGISTRATION

Pre-registration for Community Education classes is strongly encouraged. Registration at the first class session cannot be guaranteed in cases where the class is full or cancelled due to low enrollment numbers.

REFUNDS

ADULT HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

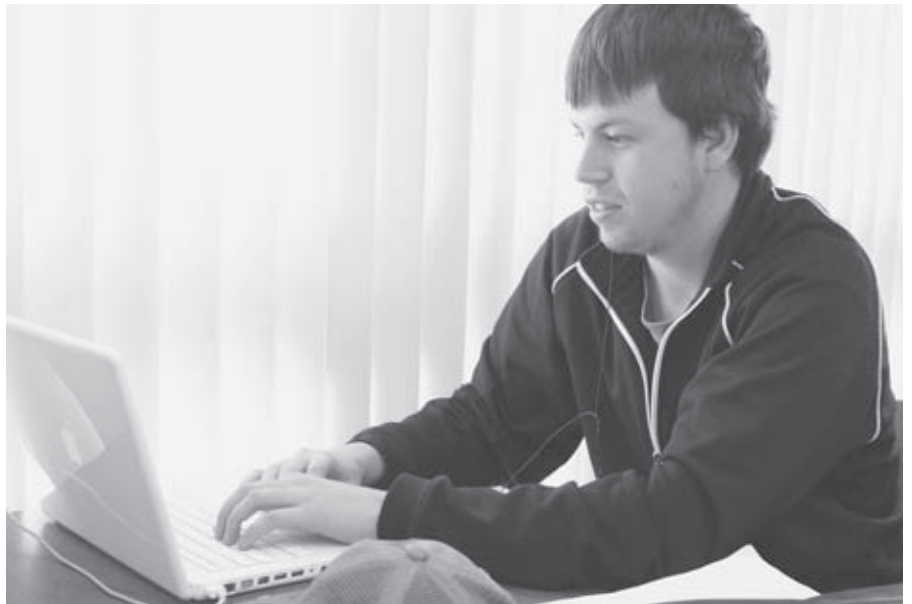
Students may also earn an Adult High School Diploma through Umpqua Community College. The Woolley Center offers the majority of the high school diploma classes. These classes run four days a week in 5 ½ week sessions. In addition to course work, adults may be eligible for high school credit from significant life experiences including work experience, military training, community service and homemaking. Classes are free for students on referral from an area high school, and \$27 per half credit for students paying their own way. WOOLLEY CENTER HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT CLASSES

The Woolley Center high school program focuses on college and career preparation. Statistics show that over 80% of jobs earning \$45,000 in Oregon require some post-secondary training: either a college degree or professional/technical certification. Yet many high school students graduate or drop out without a clear idea of what they will or can do next. The program addresses this by familiarizing students with high-growth occupations as well as local training opportunities. The goal is to kindle each student's natural interests and assist them to make plans for the future, whether they include college, vocational training, or something else altogether.

To ensure students learn up-to-date, real world information, they will hear business professionals, have job shadows and field trips, and complete hands-on projects and work samples. These experiences will become part of each student's portfolio, which in turn can be used for college admissions and job interviews. Students choose either a GED or Adult High School Diploma path. Class sizes are small, with an average of 15 students.

OREGON PATHWAYS TO ADULT BASIC SKILLS (OPABS)

Oregon Pathways for Adult Basic Skills is a program designed to help students prepare for both the GED exam and to enter college or training, in a 3-term curriculum. While preparing for the GED exam, students will also work to achieve college level reading, writing, and math. They will also learn to use the various forms of technology required for college success. Students in OPABS participate in an evidence-based cohort model, which has strong success in assisting students to earn their GEDs and enter directly into college classes. One cohort starts in the Fall, a second cohort starts in Winter, and a third cohort starts in Spring term. Students should expect to attend OPABS classes for three terms, total.

Creating a culture of legacy giving is one of the strategies not-for-profits can include in developing sustainable funding for their programs. Legacy giving or planned giving often shows up in a not-for-profit's strategic plan, but never quite gets implemented. This 6-hour workshop will give not-for-profits some simple steps and actions they can begin using immediately. The class will include defining terms and vehicles used to make a planned gift; beginning the conversation with staff, board members and donors; writing a case statement for why donors would give; and understanding that patience is crucial to developing these gifts. How to get to UCC

Easy I-5 access. Take exit 129.

If coming from the south, turn right at the stop, and left onto Umpqua College Road. If coming from the north, turn left at the stop sign, and left at the next stop sign, turn right, less than a quarter mile, at Umpqua College Road. Umpqua Community College is about one mile down the road.

Parking

Umpqua Community College provides more than 450 parking spaces conveniently located near all the campus buildings. Of these, about 171 are assigned to college faculty and staff.

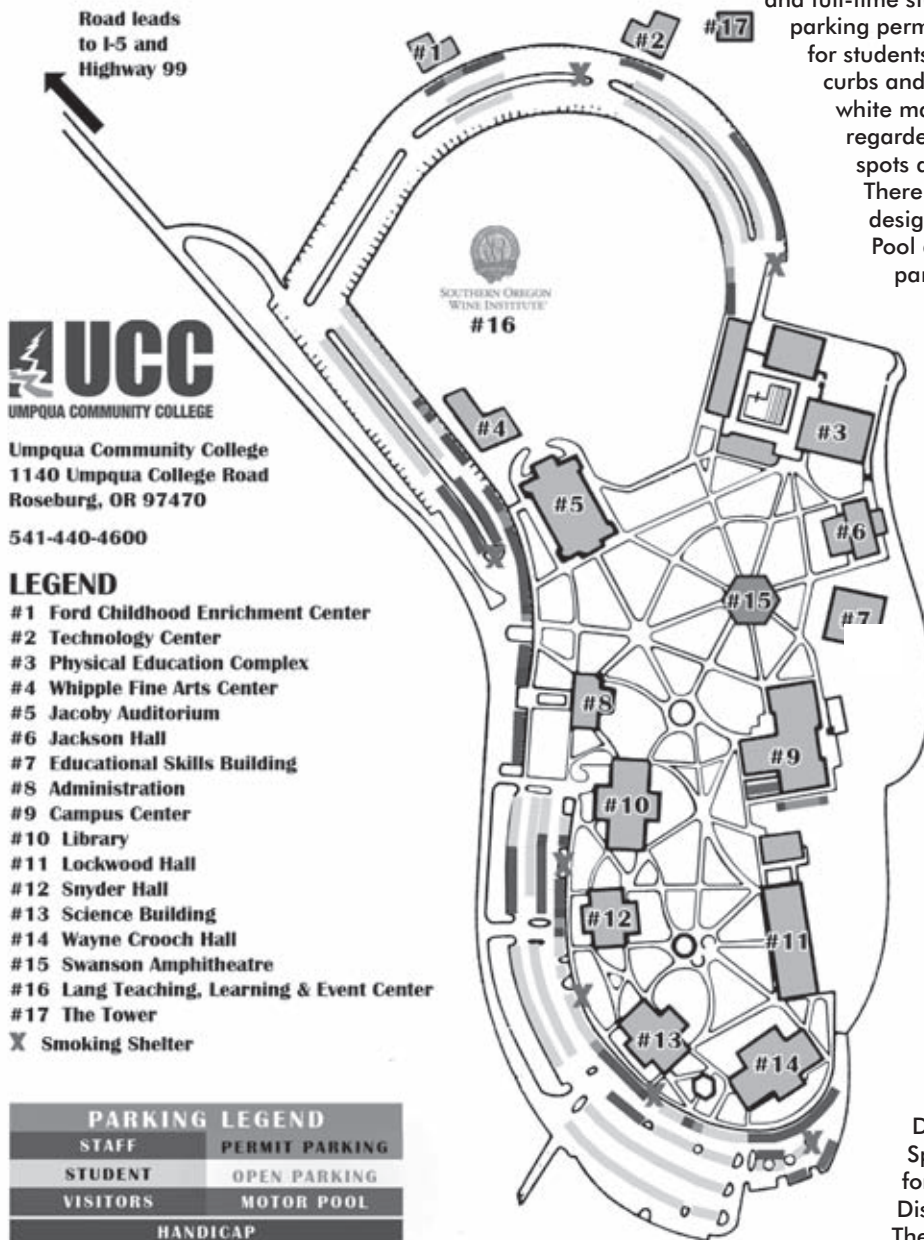
All employees are given a yearly parking permit. Designated parking spots for employees are marked by green lines, curbs and employee only signage. All part-time and full-time students also receive a yearly parking permit. Designated parking spots for students are marked by yellow lines, curbs and student only signage. All white marked lines and curbs are regarded as open parking. These spots are available to everyone.

There are 14 parking spots clearly designated for the college Motor Pool and off limits to general parking. Red zones are usually fire related areas and are considered restricted lanes and zones with no parking allowed at any time.

Visitor Parking — Visitor parking is clearly divided into 2 separate areas. One area is 30 minute visitor only and the other is Visitor Day parking only. All areas are designated by purple curbs, lines, and signage. The 30 minute only is for non-student activities and strictly enforced.

The Visitor Day parking is for specific day use only with one day permits available at the front desk of the Administrative Building or in advance through the UCC Security Department.

Disabled Person Parking — Special stickers are required for parking in clearly marked Disabled Parking spaces. These stickers are issued at the Oregon Division of Motor Vehicles.

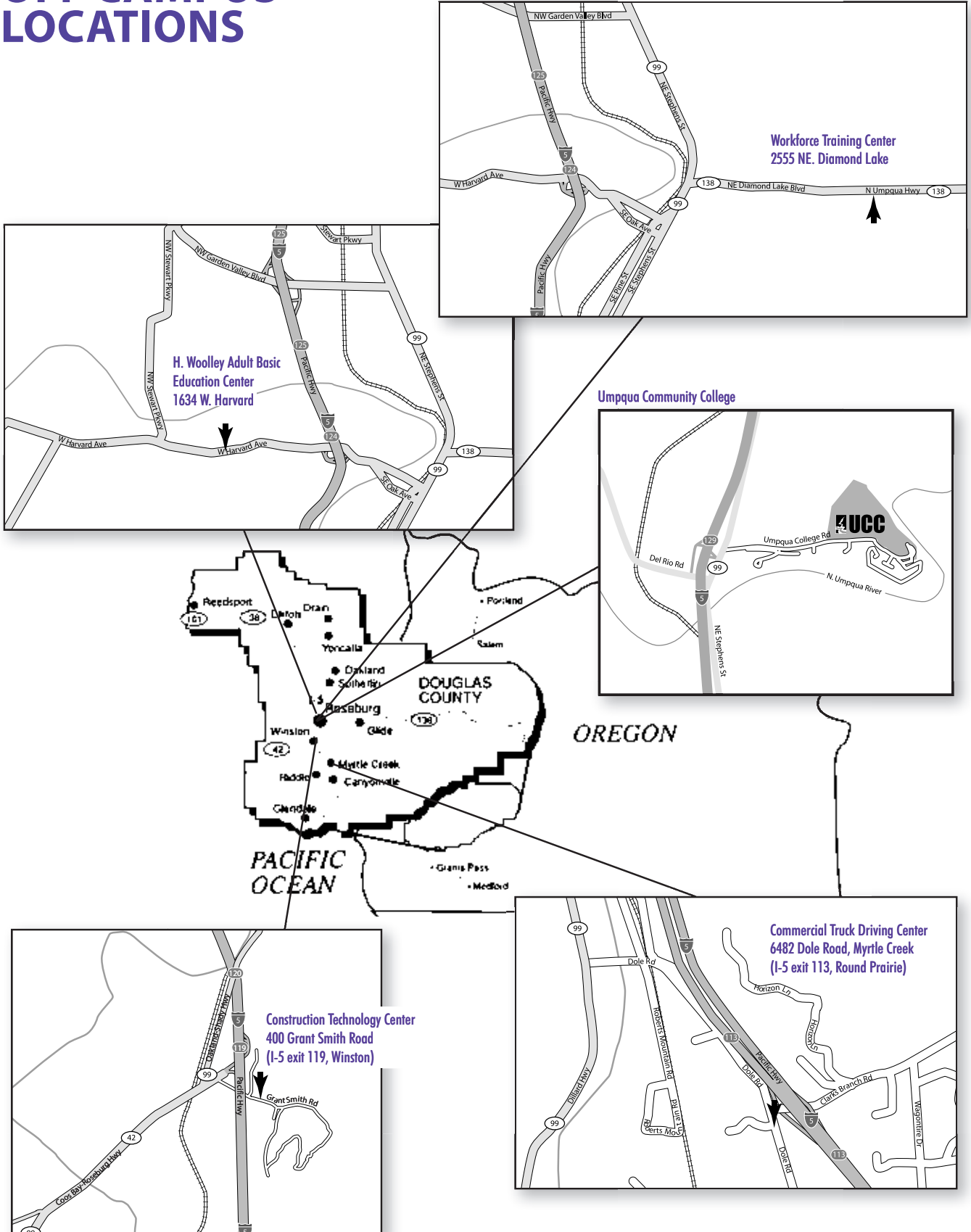



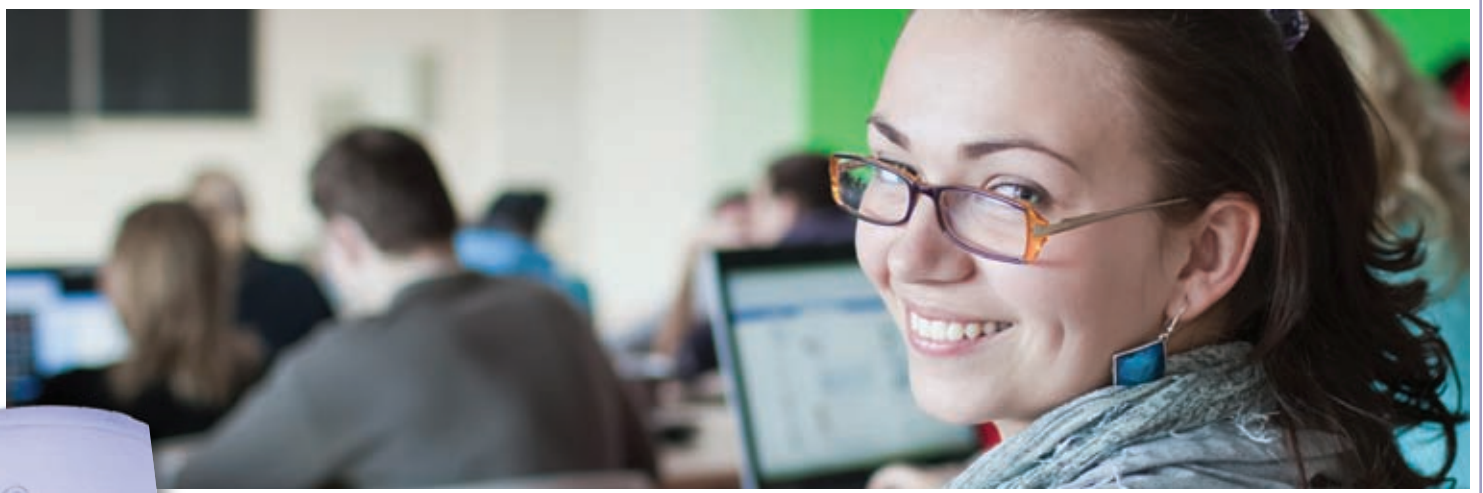

UCC BOND LEVY REQUEST ON MAY BALLOT

Umpqua Community College will be presenting its first bond levy request since 1998 to the voters on May 15. UCC will be requesting authorization for a \$40,000,000 bond levy to build an **Allied Health & Science Center** on the site behind Jacoby Auditorium, an **Industrial Arts & Technology Training Center** on the site behind the Tech Building and a **satellite campus facility** near

South Umpqua High School. The bond levy would also be used to **remodel the vacated spaces in Wayne Crooch Hall, the Science Building and Lockwood Hall.**

In 2009 UCC received an \$8,500,000 matching grant from the State of Oregon for the Allied Health & Science Building which would serve the Nursing and Dental Programs and all of the Science Programs.

UCC has applied for an additional \$8,500,000 matching grant for the Industrial Arts & Technology Training Center.

The anticipated tax rate would be approximately 29 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation on property on 25 year bonds.
